

Dear Festival of Whales Parade Participant,

The City of Dana Point is delighted that you will be participating in the Festival of Whales Parade on Saturday, March 2, 2013. To ensure the continued success of the parade and to make this day enjoyable for the parade participants and the parade viewers, we've supplied the following information which needs to be distributed to all members of your group.

Parade Date/Time

Festival of Whales Parade "Magical Migration" Saturday, March 2, 2013 Parade begins at 10:00 a.m. Parade route is approximately 1 mile.

Parade Route

The parade extends along Pacific Coast Highway southbound from Selva Road to Golden Lantern.

Staging Area

We will stage your group on Selva Road, beside the Strands Beach Parking Lot so please let the members know not to enter the parking lot area of the staging area, but rather follow the signs on Selva to the car club check-in booth. Meet at 8:00 AM.

Due to street closures beginning at 8:30am access to the Staging Area will be limited to Selva Road from Golden Lantern. Pacific Coast Highway northbound right after Golden Lantern will be closed, as well as Pacific Coast Highway south bound right after Selva Road.

Only vehicles participating in the parade will be allowed to enter or park in the staging area. For the parade participants that are being dropped off, we will have a drop off area located on Selva Road near the Strands Parking Lot entrance. Drivers can then proceed to the disband area. Another option for parade participants is to try and find parking at the end of the parade route and access the parade participant shuttle bus to the staging area. The shuttle bus will start at 7:00am. We highly suggest that if you plan on taking the shuttle bus to the staging area that you do so between the hours of 7:00am to 8:00am, as we need everyone checked in at the staging area no later than 8:45am. The shuttle bus pick/up point is at the San Juan Ave. and Violet Lantern by the Harbor House Restaurant.

The Staging Area is a very busy and exciting location on Saturday morning with all of the parade participants, including numerous car clubs and transportation buses, converging onto Strands Beach parking lot. Please share with your group's participates that for everyone's safety, no bicycles, scooters, skateboards, skate shoes or roller blades are to be ridden within the Staging Area.

Parade Entrant Check-In Procedures

- Your group leader will need to check-in your group at the registration booth, located in the Staging Area at the Strands Beach Parking lot.
- Parade check-in will take place between **7:30 a.m. and 8:45 a.m.** on Saturday morning. Please <u>do not</u> arrive prior to 7:30 a.m.
- <u>All parade entrants must be checked in by 8:45 a.m.</u>
- Due to last minute entries and placements, you will receive your parade order number at the registration/check-in area on Saturday morning, the day of the parade.



Disband Area

The Disband Area is located on San Juan Ave. between Golden Lantern and Violet Lantern. After your group completes the parade route we will have a disband shuttle bus that will take parade participants from the Disband Area back to the Staging Area. The pick up point for the shuttle bus is at San Juan Ave. and Violet Lantern by the Harbor House Restaurant.

Street Closures

Pacific Coast Highway just passed Golden Lantern and also San Juan Ave. from Violet Lantern to Golden Lantern will be closed at approximately 8:30am.

Parade Awards

All parade entries are eligible to receive an award. The categories are listed below and will be announced a few days after the parade.

Parade Rules and Regulations:

- 1. Failure to follow Parade Officials instructions shall be cause for disqualification and no awards will be issued.
- 2. At no time is any person or unit allowed to hand out or throw anything from a vehicle along the parade route.
- 3. Due to last minute entrees and placements, parade numbers will be handed out the morning of the parade when the first vehicle in your party checks in at the registration desk. Parking passes for the disband area will be handed out at this time as well.
- 4. Forward motion must be maintained throughout the parade route. Entries must remain in assigned positions throughout the entirety of the parade.
- 5. Bands directors must have in their possession parent release liability forms.
- 6. Alcoholic beverages and/or illegal substances are prohibited in the assembly area and during the parade.
- 7. Discharging of firearms, sirens or loud noises is prohibited by participants along the parade route.
- 8. For everyone's safety, no bicycles, scooters, skateboards, skate shoes or roller blades are to be ridden within the Staging Area.
- 9. All groups participating need to follow the California Vehicle code.
- 10. All groups (with the exception of school groups, marching bands or military units) will be limited to a maximum number of 25 participants.

Down In the Door



After our January 20th Planning Meeting Ronnie Bauman held an excellent Tech Session about Metropolitan Door Maintenance. Ronnie is shown here with a Met door he brought to use as a visual aid. (Did you know that Met doors were stamped out so that they could be used as either a left or right door?)

It doesn't matter which door gets water in it, if the water does not drain out your ask-

ing for a rust problem. Ronnie pointed out that water easily enters the door on the outside of

the window. When you wash your car that is the first place to NOT shoot a stream of water at. The only way water is going to drain out of the door is through the three drain slots at he bottom near the outside edge. See below.



Logic tells you that these slots need to always be clear and free from anything up inside your door. I've had my



Met for 6 years but have never had the door panels off to look inside my doors. So with care I removed them and found a small amount of sand, dirt and rust. The drain slots were pretty clear of debris so I was lucky. After scraping, wire brushing, vacuuming,

damp wiping and drying I painted the lower part of the interior with Rust Destroyer. To the left is the forward interior of my right door before treatment and then after treatment. Final photo shows where rust has eaten all the way through on a Met's door not maintained!





Meet the Abergs, Goran, Dahlin & Elin. Goran is MOCNA member #2648. He has owned his 1957 Met hardtop for 47 years. It has been all around Europe down to Spain, over the Alps (not through the tunnels) and around Scotland. He stored it between 1970 and 1980 while he completely restored it and then handed the car over to his eldest daughter for a couple of years, then to the younger one for some

years. About 10 years ago he stored it again in Sweden since he lived in Norway and didn't want to start fighting a bureaucracy with high import taxes etc by taking it over the border. We would have a recent photo of it but it is still in storage.

Dear Ken,

Thank you for your long and informative mail. I have looked on your website and found that your chapter is very active and having quite some fun. An advantage you have is nice, warm and stable weather. I really envy you for that. If I and my wife make it for the US in the end of next summer we will certainly try to make a detour to your place down south. I have not been in contact with Egon Stridh but just by chance last month saw an issue of the Swedish magazine Nostalgia who had an article about a Swedish Met.

I bought my Met in 1966 and used it partly as a field car working as a student/geologist in the mountain chain in the northern part of Sweden. Rural people are known to be more open and friendly than urban people but I was amazed by the reception I got. People were waving their hands at me wherever I went. However, after some time I learnt that there was another white/ yellow Met in the area belonging to a local guy. Really a coincidence since only about 178 Mets were sold in Sweden and then mainly as town cars. When I met the guy he wanted to sell me the car as he had found out it was a catastrophe on snowy and icy roads which are the normal conditions up there most of the year.

I will send you some photos from 1985 when I had pulled down the car, overhauled and resprayed it. The car is from 1957, HNK 3 HL -210 623, left hand drive. Apart from changing bearings, gaskets, brakes (linings-cylinders), etc. I put an extra blade on the rear suspension (sagging) which you can see from the photos. Since the original engine was rather run down I put in an Austin AS5 after some time. But since I had a spare MGB 1800 engine I later on replaced the A55 with that one. The MGB one fitted easily but it was some work to hook it up to the Metropolitan gearbox. The electrical system is completely rebuilt to negative ground, all wires changed and upgraded to 1.5-2.5 mm, lights-horn on relays, electric fuel pump, etc. I also fitted an electronic rev counter since the speedometer stops at 125 kph. I have taken the Met up to 6000 revs (25 kph/1000 revs) but that is not advisable since the handling performance is not matching that speed.

The original engine was not too good as I mentioned above, drinking lots of oil. Since there was no oil filter on the old ones they probably ran down more quickly. But I got friendly with the owner of the local gas station and got free waste oil and also ran the car on 50/50 petrol/ kerosene. The latter being tax-free and cost almost nothing but the smell was not of jasmine. With the ASS engine I made some long trips down in Europe. On one occasion along the west coast of Denmark, Germany, Holland, Belgium and France. Then over the Pyrenees into Andorra and Spain. Getting into Andorra was special since it was about 40 C and the altitude almost 2000 meters so the road was lined with boiling cars. The Met went along quite OK with the heater on and fan on full speed but suddenly the car stalled.

soon understood that it was not the engine but the fuel that was boiling and wrapped the fuel pump (mechanical), fuel line and carburetor with toilet paper soaked in water. Engine started nicely and the little Met passed the whole queue in good style. Then the car has been to Italy, Switzerland, England, Scotland and around Sweden quite a lot. It has been a really good little workhorse and in those days one never bothered if the car had a problem since they were always easily solved in contrast to today's computer run machines. In the late 1990's my elder

daughter had the car for some years, since I was working abroad a lot, but when she moved to France I got the car back. Then my younger daughter had it for some years but moved to central Stockholm with all the problems having a car in a big non-car friendly town. So I have it stored for the moment but hope to soon give it an overhaul and put it on the road again. It really is a summer car but works well in the winter too. Started easily even if it was below -25 C and the heater was quite ok with the standards of that time.



Only problem was icy roads, diagonal tires, heavy under steering and light rear. A very bad combination but I used to have a big sack of sand in the trunk in order to get more pressure on the rear tires.

Swedes caught onto the classic American car craze more than half a century ago. The country boasts more restored 1950s classics than the US, according to some estimates. An estimated 500 classic cars – such as Pontiac Silver Streaks and Plymouth Road Runners – are

shipped to Sweden each year. And the fervor built around these cars is fueling a subculture of American nostalgia in Scandinavia.

In 2010 we were in Sweden visiting our former exchange student and her family. In a public parking lot in Halmstad I spotted this nice little two-door hardtop Dodge Dart . Editor







Even here in Southern California these past weeks it has been cold enough to need the heater in our Mets. You have used it this winter haven't you? Pull the dash control knob full out for max heat. Turn the same knob to turn on and control the fan speed. Open the heater doors under the dash to warm up your feet or close them to direct the air flow up through the

dash vents. In the colder latitudes of this country that's known as "defrosting the windshield"!

Just so you truly appreciate how modern your Met's system is (or was in the 1950's) what follows is an excerpt from a 25 page sales & information manual dated May, 1954. It is by J.W. Watson, General Sales Manager at Nash Motors Division, Nash-Kelvinator Corporation, Detroit, Michigan. The title is "What the Metropolitan means to the Nash Dealer, salesman and owner:

"There is no sounder basis upon which to try to win public favor than that of constantly trying to give the public better values down through the years to come.

This applies not only to the basic car itself, but to all functional conveniences to improve the pleasure of ownership. As an example, once again Nash dealers will be ahead of the industry with the finest new engineering development in years, the Nash All- Weather Eye Air Conditioning System. This <u>complete</u> air conditioning system is so new and revolutionary that every existing system on the market is made obsolete. Here, for the first time, is one, single, complete system that cools, heats, ventilates the entire passenger compartment, front seat and back -- spring, summer, winter, fall -- all automatically and all by one simple thermostatic' control. It cools people not only faster but more evenly than anything now on the market. It will not shock the human system with cold draIts on the back of the neck. It will not fog or frost up windows. It will eliminate the usual stuffy, clammy, stale inside air because it continually brings in fresh outside air -- cleans It, filters it, cools and dehumidifies it, circulates it evenly, without draft. And at a price almost half of many competitors air conditioning systems, and lower than any.

Nash pioneered the whole plan of fresh air heating and ventilating in 1937 and,

today, there is no other system as efficient as the Nash Weather Eye. Nash has made bold moves before and has come out ahead. It pioneered Bonderizing, Airliner Reclining Seats ...
